

Divorce and Its Impact on Children

Does doing "everything" in an abusive household versus a seemingly loving but false and judgmental children's acceptance of parental divorce?

Abusive Household?
Children reject parents after divorce or separation. A child will hate the parent but will long for that parent's love from their parents.
The removal of an abusive parent from a child's life depends on the rejected parent.
Developmental trauma in the family system can lead to child rejection, often facilitated by the parent (abuse like sexual, spiritual, and emotional). Children who experience parental rejection face systematic and may result in future violence and trauma of unmet needs.

Seemingly Loving but False:
Abuse frequently needs three people who do not love one another. The kids are frequently required to do so as a necessary way.
Does not work. The young person has neither one who to turn to in times of need.
The negative idea that love is full of expectations is harmful. The parent's role during a hard transition is to let things be, without including children and victims of violence.



N. & P. Profile of Executive Subjects Who Report on Marital Dissolution
(Executive Summary, 2002)

2002 Public Research Institute Study
This study examined the relationship between marital dissolution and the mental health of children aged 12 years and older.
The study found that children of divorce have higher rates of mental health problems than children of intact families.
The study also found that children of divorce have higher rates of behavioral problems than children of intact families.
The study concluded that the mental health of children of divorce is significantly higher than that of children of intact families.

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What is the impact of divorce on the development of the children?
Separation and Conflict Impact on the Child Development
Separation refers to a child's separation from one parent due to continuous criticism.
It leads to anxiety, depression, low self-esteem, and difficulty forming secure attachment.

Are There Long-Term Effects of Divorce on Children?
• Development of anxiety and depression
• Interpersonal relationship difficulties
• Increased risk of substance use disorders
• Physical health difficulties

Ways we can help children adjust to their parents' divorce:
- Plan how you will tell your children.
- Reassure your children that you still love them.
- Be very clear that they are not the cause of the separation.
- Encourage your children to talk openly about their feelings.
- Help them find someone they can trust.
- Tell your children only what they need to know (source)

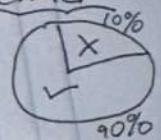

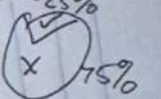

When they see the process of why their parents are divorcing, they understand and are more willing to accept it but

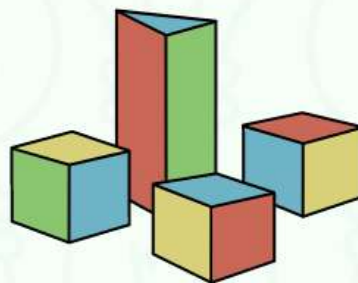
- Children might or will reject parents after divorce or separation because they could be traumatized by the caregiver and don't want to get near or close to that individual.

- Plan how you will tell your children. It's best if both parents can do it together. Find a good place and time to talk. Be honest but also keep your children's ages in mind because we don't want too much details or less details.

What is the impact of divorce on the development of the children?

-A child could feel more a little distance from one of the parent because of a parental alienation that criticize the other parent.

-It can lead to long-lasting negative effects on the child's emotional well-being and development and this can result anxiety, depression, low self-esteem and difficulty forming secure attachments.

-When parent keep talking bad about the other parent. Over time, they will develop overly negative or distorted views of the alienated parent.

What we want to see is the respectful co-parenting and open communication because this really affects the child's well-being. It should always be the top priority over parent disagreements.
